



The Ideal Church

It doesn't get any better than last Sunday. 400 people here for the two Easter services, and the second service began with a baptism. God continues to work in his church in ways that are beyond knowledge or understanding. So appropriate are these words from The New Union Prayer Book: "How filled with awe is this place and we did not know it."

A woman in the Southeast, who prefers to remain anonymous, wrote these words about her vision of the ideal church:

"There's no sign. There's no advertising. People just come. They've heard that there's something special happening 'up there.' The building is open almost constantly. The community knows all about it, and uses it for multiple purposes, civic meetings, support groups. When they come into the building for their meetings, they see visible signs of what God is doing at that place.

"They're all shapes and sizes, overgrown hippies in sandals and beards, business men in power suits, young men in pony tails who don't even own a suit, grandmothers, young mothers without husbands towing four or five filthy children. Some have lived hard lives—drug addicts, prostitutes—some have lived successful lives and manage multi-million dollar companies. But all are empty, and they have come seeking more. And they are finding it.

"They have found a place to belong. Where people are real, where needs are met, where lives are changed. They were completely unprepared for what they experienced when they first came: friendly faces, multiple handshakes, cups of warm coffee and lots of conversation. They found it to be relaxed, not stuffy like churches they'd been to in the past. The songs are catchy and easy to sing along with and the enthusiasm is contagious.

"They actually hear people tell stories of how their lives are different because of Jesus and the strength they receive from Christian fellowship. They've heard about people taking care of strangers, giving them food, clothing, places to live, money to meet their bills.

"They see people moved by the power of the gospel story, and they see how Jesus is lived as a servant among believers. The list of ministries to hurting people is endless, and those being served are coming to Jesus because they see hope for the first time in their lives. They're realizing what being a part of this family is about, and they don't want to be left out." *G. Crowe*

And don't forget to come to the Spring Banquet next Saturday, April 29 at 7:30 pm! Tickets are still on sale for \$10.

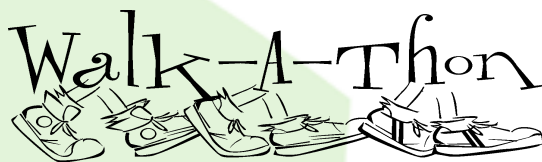

Last Monday night I spoke to a men's gathering at the Crossroads Christian Church. I chose as my topic a bird's-eye view of the restructuring that Elmwood has done the past 18 months with the work of the Health Team. I also reviewed the work that continues through the SHAPE classes as the elders attempt to encourage every member of Elmwood to become a contributing member as he/she uses the spiritual gifts God has given us.

After we were dismissed, a member of the Fowler Christian Church introduced himself and told me the story of their church's experience in doing virtually the same thing we are doing. He said that for 40 years or more their church has hovered in the 70 to 90 range. Over the past year that church has concentrated on helping every member find and begin to use the spiritual gifts God has given to the church, and with everybody's participation the church has grown to 170 in just the past year. This is the "all by itself" principle of church growth: we do what we're supposed to, and "all by itself" (with God's help and direction) the church will grow. -Gayle Crowe

From Lawlessness To Righteousness

“In those days Israel had no king; everyone did as he saw fit” (Judges 21:25). These final words from the book of Judges sum up the lawlessness and depravity of the book’s last five chapters. Without a king, God’s chosen people engaged in unspeakable depravities—just read Judges 17-21 to see the depressing litany of sins, from idolatry to kidnapping and murder, along with perhaps the most repulsive story in the entire Bible.

It is fitting that this kingless lawlessness is included along with most of the book of Romans in this week’s readings, because Romans 1 begins with a catalogue of just the kinds of sins illustrated at the close of Judges. Unlike the depressing “every man for himself” ending of Judges, however, Paul offers a different outcome in Romans. While the Israelites of Judges had no king, Christians live under the reign of Jesus Christ. Praise God for the difference that makes!

It may well be that we live in a culture like that of Judges, in which people do as they see fit, but let it not be said of us that we have no king. Jesus is our king. And as Paul writes in Romans 14:17, “the kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking, but of righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Spirit.” Because of the dominion of Jesus over our lives, we live not trapped in depravity and evil, but embraced by righteousness, peace, and joy because of our King and his Spirit who lives within us.
